## **POPCORN STORAGE**

### GOOD HOUSE KEEPING GUIDE FOR CINEMAS

#### STORAGE:

- 1. Store popcorn off concrete floors in a cool; dry environment away from ultra violet light.
- 2. Stock must be rotated use oldest first
- 3. Every 4-6 weeks spray a new pallet with insect surface spray and restack corn. Lightly spray over and around bags.
- 4. Check rodent baits for scratches or activity.
- 5. Keep storeroom clean

#### PESTS:

#### A. RODENTS:

1. Rats and mice love dark, cluttered places where they can live in peace. They will make nests in undisturbed popcorn. They eat the corn and pose a genuine health threat.

#### **REMEDY:**

- 1. Make a bait station. Obtain some 4" (100mm) 6" (150mm) PVC pipe around 12" (300mm) 18" (450mm) long. Write 'rat bait' or similar on it in texta.
- 2. Purchase some waxed rat bait or pellets from the local supermarket and place one kind inside the PVC pipe.
- 3. Place bait station in secluded, quiet place. Eg. behind corn, cartons, against wall etc. Somewhere away from foot traffic.
- 4. Check regularly for scratches or activity on the baits. If you have scratches, you have rodents.

5. Change the bait using different formulations or brands every 4-6 weeks. You wouldn't eat the same food every day – rats don't like to either.

#### **B. BAG MOTHS:**

- 1. More of a nuisance than a health hazard but can really turns customers off their popcorn. They live off the dust found in popcorn or other food materials such as ice cream cone dust or similar.
- 2. Moths can enter your cinema via open doors or in natural products such as corn.
- 3. All staff should look out for moths when checking storerooms. Look on walls & ceilings they are not necessarily found near lights. Look for the moth cacoons they look like a grain of rice wrapped in spider's web. Look for the caterpillars they are often mistaken for maggots.

#### **REMEDY:**

- 1. You must break the egg, caterpillar, moth, egg..... cycle and this cannot be done by **ONE** visit from the pest controller. They will need to come back regularly to spray over a few weeks to eliminate each cycle as it reaches the moth stage.
- 2. You can do the same thing by purchasing a household insect bomb a slow release insecticide from your local supermarket. Use it in your storeroom overnight it will act as a silent policeman.
- 3. Or purchase a household insect spray and use it whenever you see a moth. You do this at home with flies the same principle applies here.
- 4. And purchase a household surface spray and spray onto pallets, edges, corners, and any crevice where a moth can lay an egg.
- 5. Every 4-6 weeks spray a new area with surface insect spray and restack all your popcorn there. Lightly spray over bags also. This shouldn't be too difficult a task if rotation of corn is a regular habit at the cinema.
- 6. If you see cacoons or caterpillars, simply pick them up or brush them down and destroy. The spray will not be very effective here.

#### C. WEEVILS:

This is normally the Saw Toothed Grain Beetle and looks like a mini rhinoceros. These eat the corn and they are hard to kill. Call SUPERPOP to exchange corn.
